AFTER THE INITIAL SERIES OF KITTEN VACCINATIONS AN ANNUAL BOOSTER IS RECOMMENDED.

In order to assure the health of your new kitten, it should be seen by a veterinarian within 72 hours after receipt. The stress of shipping, different foods and or water along with being separated from littermates and from mother can weaken a kittens resistance. Watch for unusual signs ie.; vomiting, sneezing,, fever, diarrhea, runny nose, or skin lesions. Should any of these symptoms be present seek veterinary care. Isolate the new arrival from other feline household members during the "stress" period as this will enable the new arrival to familiarize itself with the new surroundings without being threatened. This will also help to prevent spread of any disease that the resident cats may harbor and spread during the time of stress. DO NOT give the kitten milk If you can not provide your new cat/kitten with the same food he/she is used to (Royal Canin Adult Fit or Kitten) switch the diet gradually adding small amounts of new food to the familiar food. The same is true for the litter box. This cat/kitten has been used to pine pellets. Gradually introduce the new cat/kitten to resident pets, and expect some hissing and spitting for a few days prior to friendship. This is normal.
